The "Healthy Villages Program" is an umbrella term for a series of public health projects that directly support the health and well-being of the villages and communities UVP serves. UVP targets the primary health risks of the region at a village-level, working with the District Health Office, local health centers, village leadership, and community-based organizations to onboard, graduate, and support villages along the continuum of programs.

From the Co-Chairs

Despite the continued challenges posed by COVID-19 in 2021, Uganda Village Project persevered, delivering high-quality, evidence-based preventative health care. As we look back, there are so many moments of joy to celebrate, despite the uncertainty that came with each COVID-19 surge. The entire team — staff, board, Fistula Ambassadors, Village Health Teams, and our local partners — demonstrated resilience and dedication to promoting good health and well-being for all Ugandans.

We're proud to report that in 2021, UVP onboarded three Healthy Villages, supporting 16 villages in total. We administered 1,077 HIV tests and held 21 events where we met with and provided HIV education to 4,824 members of the community; we conducted 92 reproductive health events that reached 3,141 men, women, and youths; 38 malaria events that reached 5,543 people; 35 WASH events that reached 2,747 people; and provided 86 obstetric fistula repair surgeries in addition to reaching 11,363 people with education on how to prevent this devastating childbirth injury. We also resumed our yearly internship program, welcoming 24 individuals from the United States and Uganda to join our team for 8 weeks.

For a fourth year in a row, we welcomed volunteers from New York University's Wagner Graduate School of Public Service to help improve our impact survey and formed a new partnership with the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business to consult on strategic aims central to our long-term organizational growth.

In 2022 and beyond, we look forward to UVP's continued success in building a healthier and brighter future with and for the communities we serve in Iganga.




HIV/AIDS & STIs

Although gains have been realized in the last decade, HIV prevalence remains high in Uganda – especially among men aged 45-49 and girls aged 15-19, when compared to boys of the same age.

UVP continues to work on increasing knowledge of HIV status through targeted outreach, testing and counselling, including "Moonlight" events that accommodate those who work during the day (often men).

HIV Tests Administered



In 2021, UVP held 21 events, reaching 4,284 people with education and administering 1,077 HIV tests.

When Kasita first found out about her status, she was frightened and upset. She had never sought HIV testing for herself, though she was quite familiar with UVP's free HIV testing services at Bugono Health Centre IV.

Through UVP-led community sensitization, women like Kasita have been able to learn their status, seek life-saving treatment, and undo harmful myths to live a happy, healthy life. Kasita now looks to the future with confidence and hope.





Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH)

Under UVP's Healthy Villages initiative, hygiene and sanitation programs supplement innovative and comprehensive water chain interventions to ensure safe water is available for our communities. As a core tenet of our programs, the WASH program involves hands-on learning that secures a trusted bond with community members and builds a strong foundation for improving long-term health. In 2021, we reached 2,747 community members with important water chain education.


Malaria

Malaria is second leading cause of death in Uganda, disproportionately affecting women, children, the elderly and HIV-positive individuals. It is the leading direct cause of infant and under-five mortality. Beyond the devastating loss of life, the disease also significantly impacts the economy due to missed workdays, decreased productivity, and decreased school attendance. To combat this significant threat to the health of the Uganda population, in 2021, UVP hosted 38 community education events, tested 4,216 individuals, and reached 5,543 people with critical education to prevent malaria transmission.

UVP supports our communities with malaria testing and treatment, and house-to-house "sensitizations" where our team checks for proper bed net usage, standing water near the home, and provides on-the-spot myth-busting.

Reproductive Health



Ritah, a mother of three, was living hand-to-mouth, juggling child care and the farm - the family's source of income. Ritah learned about UVP's family planning services and was able to get a free Depo-Provera shot.

"I appreciate UVP for providing such free service to the community - I didn't pay a single coin."



Our reproductive health activities are designed with long-standard cultural traditions, and potential barriers, in mind. We aim to provide education and family planning options that meet an individual's personal need and help community members see the benefits of family planning and birth spacing. We specifically outreached to adolescents through engaging sports events, reaching more than 1,551 youth directly. We also provided targeted outreach to men to converse about family planning issues and how to best support women.

Obstetric Fistula

86 fistula surgeries supported

11,363 individuals received fistula education



"Sometimes when life becomes especially difficult, we wonder if everyone in the world has forgotten us ... I never lost hope because I had always dreamed of living a positive life".

Obstetric fistula is a devastating childbirth injury for which surgery is the only cure. Women are left incontinent and often shunned by their communities as a result. We partnered with Kamuli Mission Hospital, Uganda Childbirth Injury Fund and Fistula Foundation to arrange fistula repair and reintegration camps, facilitating surgeries for 86 women.

Stella Never Lost Hope

Just 22 years old, Stella is a survivor of sexual assault and rape, and a recovered obstetric fistula repair surgery patient.

At the age of 16, Stella was raped by multiple intruders. This traumatic event left her unable to control her bladder for months. At 19. Stella became pregnant and after a complicated birth that lasted for days, sadly, her baby passed away. To make matters worse, Stella developed an obstetric fistula. Her husband was not supportive and left her for another woman after realizing the complexity of Stella's health concerns. An initial attempt at repair surgery failed, but Stella persisted.

She eventually received a phone call from a friend that would lead her to the UVP-supported Kamuli Mission Hospital. It was here that Stella received her second and successful repair surgery. She is now surrounded by a community of friends and fellow survivors.

Internship



The UVP Internship brings together graduate and undergraduate students from around the world studying international development, public health, and medicine. During the program, interns live side-by-side with community members, working on HIV, malaria, WASH, and reproductive health - in collaboration with local villages and our partners in Iganga. Interns advocate for community health and development, they help build sustainable and culturallyappropriate public health programs, and they engage in cross-cultural learning.

Twenty-four interns joined our team from June to August 2021. Our internship coordinators – aka "The Twins" – helped us deliver a successful, safe, and impactful experience, despite COVID-19 challenges.


