

## HIV/AIDS

IN EARLY 2022, COVID-19 RESTRICTIONS IMPOSED BY THE **UGANDAN GOVERNMENT WERE** LIFTED, ALLOWING UVP TO **SAFELY CONTINUE OUR** HIV/AIDS PROGRAMMING.

WITH FUNDING FROM VIIV **HEALTH CARE, WE PROVIDED** 951 HIV TESTS, AND COMMUNITY **EDUCATION FOR 2,845 PEOPLE.** 

951 **HIV** tests

During the pandemic, we found that smallerscale community gatherings proved to be as effective as large-scale events of the past. There remains a strong willingness from community members to attend outreach events, educate themselves, and learn their HIV status.

In 2022, UVP held 12 community events to share relevant HIV/AIDS knowledge and awareness, prevent transmission and refer positive cases for treatment and counseling.

#### IVAN

UVP partnered with Busembatya Health Centre to host an integrated HIV, malaria, and STI outreach event at a local mosque. For many individuals that UVP meets, participation at one of our outreach events marks the first time they have ever been tested for HIV. It was here that we met Ivan.

Ivan recalled hearing many radio messages explaining the HIV epidemic and offering guidance on how to get tested, yet he never found himself taking action. Fear, pride, anxiety — these are common feelings for those that have never tested. To Ivan, finding out he may be HIV+ was like issuing a death sentence.

It wasn't until Ivan met UVP interns that he started to take a keen interest. He started regularly attending sensitization sessions led by the intern teams, asking for clarification when he didn't fully understand the information being presented.

During our integrated program at the local mosque, Ivan nervously took his first HIV test. Fortunately, the result was negative. From that moment, Ivan pledged to live a "responsible life" – determined to avoid another "narrow escape," as he called it.

Testing was a major milestone for Ivan, and a major shift in his view on how he can personally play a role in ending the epidemic.

UVP continues to work on increasing knowledge of HIV status through targeted outreach, testing and counselling, including "Moonlight" events that accommodate those who work during the day (often men).



## WASH (WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE)

Under UVP's Healthy Villages initiative, hygiene and sanitation programs supplement innovative and comprehensive water chain interventions to ensure safe water is available for our communities.

As a core tenet of our programs, the WASH program involves hands-on learning that secures a trusted bond with community members and builds a strong foundation for improving long-term health. In 2022, we reached 430 community members with

### A TRASH PIT IS A **DEDICATED SPACE** FOR WASTE, UVP **HELPED CONSTRUCT 42 OF THEM IN 2022.**

**EDINANSI** and her husband live in a tworoom house with their five young children -vulnerable to water-borne illnesses. While Edinansi's husband was initially hesitant to construct a standard pit latrine and plate stand at their home, after attending UVP's WASH sensitization event, he learned that using the family's scarce resources could be effective in preventing devastating health issues and saving costs in the long run.

Selling bricks to finance the renovation, Edinansi's husband renovated the latrine and made a plate stand. He used more bricks to construct a permanent wall on the latrine for extra privacy. UVP 's WASH sensitizations supported Edinansi and her husband to adopt new skills to protect the health of their family. Their children used to fall sick one after another, but now their medical bills are lower.

Together, through the joint efforts of UVP, Village Health Teams (VHTs), and families themselves, we continue to create broad changes in our communities and support countless other families.

### **MALARIA**

**RECHEAL** from Buswiga Village has first hand experience of the devastating effects of malaria. Her three children have always suffered from bouts of malaria, and she lost her youngest to the disease when he was one.

Everyone in Recheal's family currently sleeps under a long-lasting insecticide-treated mosquito net (ITN) -- the most effective treatment for malaria -- though this wasn't always the case. Recheal said that she used to dislike them: "I would feel very uncomfortable at night. A mosquito net would make me feel like I am suffocating. It was very hot, and I would have bad dreams."

One of the obstacles to reducing malaria cases in Uganda is myths and misconceptions about mosquito net usage and a general lack of knowledge about their essential role in malaria prevention. A vital aspect of UVP's work to reduce malaria infections is sensitization -- an education method with the aim of educating communities about malaria and its transmission, symptoms, treatment, and prevention.

Recheal purchased two subsidized nets after attending a UVP sensitization event and learning about the importance and effectiveness of consistent mosquito net usage. After using the nets every night, she noticed that her children, who used to fall sick, were no longer missing school due to illness and were able to go a whole term without contracting malaria.

IN 2022, UVP HOSTED 15 COMMUNITY **EDUCATION EVENTS, WHERE WE** TREATED INDIVIDUALS FOR MALARIA **AND REACHED COMMUNITIES WITH** CRITICAL EDUCATION TO PREVENT MALARIA TRANSMISSION.

### REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH



### OUR ACTIVITIES ARE DESIGNED WITH LONG-STANDING CULTURAL TRADITIONS IN MIND. WE PROVIDE EDUCATION AND RESOURCES THAT MEET AN INDIVIDUAL'S NEEDS TO ATTAIN OPTIMAL REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH.

In addition to community-wide adult reproductive health services, UVP received a grant from the Anna Lalor Burdick Program of The Lalor Foundation to launch a Youth Champions initiative. Our aim was to better reach and engage youth in Iganga District.

Building upon previously proven programming that involved sports activities as a means of engaging youth, we appointed and trained champions from 9 villages, serving as peer role models and advocates.

Iganga District has a high unmet need for contraceptives, and unmarried adolescents are more likely to have an unmet need for contraceptives compared to their married counterparts. Our pilot aimed to increase general reproductive health knowledge, reduce misconceptions

and myths about family planning, increase family planning uptake, and ultimately reduce unplanned and unwanted pregnancies.

UVP hosted 54 youth-oriented events, supporting 2299 youths with reproductive health education and 446 girls with a contraception they desired.

With gracious funding from Bushrod H. Campbell and Adah F. Hall Charity Fund at the end of the year, we began planning an expansion of our youth program.

In 2023, we will partner with 10 schools, providing in-school education sessions and out-of-school events including sports activities and workshops teaching girls to fabricate hand-sewn, reusable sanitary pads to better support their menstrual needs.

#### **NURSE NALUKWAGO**

Nurse Nalukwago works at Idinda Health Centre II, located in Busembatya. This health center plays a central role in the effort to strengthen the health system.

Nalukwago supports clients referred to her by UVP. For family planning, malaria or HIV needs, she's one short phone call away and always ready to serve the community.

UVP partners with nurses at health centres to ensure that women have children by choice, not by chance. We work together to conduct education sessions on family planning, contraception, and birth spacing to increase access to reproductive health resources and encourage uptake of healthy practices.

According to Nurse Nalukwago, family planning uptake has increased and birth rates are falling due to free services provided at health centres like hers.



### **OBSTETRIC FISTULA**

26,238 114 individuals fistula received fistula surgeries education supported





OBSTETRIC FISTULA IS A DEVASTATING CHILDBIRTH INJURY FOR WHICH SURGERY IS THE ONLY CURE. WOMEN ARE LEFT INCONTINENT, OFTEN SHUNNED BY THEIR COMMUNITIES. UVP PROVIDES NO-COST SURGERIES AND POST-OPERATIVE CARE.

**SCOVIA** married the love of her life in her teens, and became pregnant with a baby boy soon after. But her labor was plagued with complications; after three long days laboring, Scovia fell into a coma.

Too far from the nearest health facility, her husband decided to pull the baby out himself. Scovia survived, though her son was stillborn. Five days later, she noticed she was leaking. At first, Scovia thought it was water, and a normal postpartum experience. She had never heard of an obstetric fistula.

Two decades later, Scovia is well acquainted with fistulas.

Scovia is one of 114 women that received fistula repair surgery and 29 women who attended our long-term recovery care without paying a cent-in 2022. Support for women like Scovia is made possible by the hard work of UVP's Fistula Ambassadors, our clinical and surgical partners at UGANDA CHILDBIRTH INJURY FUND and KAMULI MISSION HOSPITAL, and with generous support from FISTULA FOUNDATION.

### INTERNSHIP



### **EIGHT INTERNS AND** TWO COORDINATORS JOINED UVP FROM JUNE-AUGUST 2022.

During the program, interns lived side-byside with community members, working in collaboration with local villages and our partners to advocate for community health and development.


They helped build sustainable and culturallyappropriate public health programs, and they engaged in cross-cultural learning with their communities and fellow interns.







