By scaling our reintegration support, we aim to address persistent stigma, foster community acceptance, and empower women economically, ensuring long-term success for all.

Program Highlights

Obstetric Fistula

With a foothold now established in the Kiryandongo region, we trained 30 new Fistula Ambassadors in January. We equally welcomed 30 ambassadors, including 3 new ambassadors, to our annual debrief and training session in Iganga. UVP's Fistula Ambassadors simultaneously led 255 community meetings this past quarter, reaching over **24,000** people!

Our first fistula camp of 2025 took place in March at Kiryandongo Hospital, where 41 women received life-changing treatment. Ten of these women will join our reintegration program beginning in April. We are deeply grateful for the continued support of the Fistula Foundation, whose commitment makes this work possible. Their flexibility and compassion ensure that even women with the most complex cases—requiring referral to Uganda's National Referral Hospital in Mulago—receive the treatment they so desperately need.

We have recently forged a new partnership with Busolwe Hospital in eastern Uganda. The hospital has just undergone a 28 billion shillings renovation, and we are thrilled to have the opportunity to work together to support women in this region. Our first camp will be hosted at Busolwe at the end of April.

Reproductive Health

We partnered with 8 new secondary schools and 2 returning schools to deliver our adolescent reproductive health program to a new cohort of students, reaching 1,163 students this quarter. We look forward to bringing our program to 5 new communities next guarter including: Nawangaizi, Buswiga, Buganza, Naibiri & Buwolomera.
